IMPORTANT "NEW" INFORMATION FOR 2025

- Poultry and Dairy Cows are currently banned from all 2025 fairs. The fair has set a date of June 1st to determine whether poultry and dairy cows will be allowed locally. If the state ban is lifted by Jun 1st, the fair will have poultry and dairy cow exhibits. If the state ban is not lifted by June 1st, the fair will NOT have poultry and dairy cow exhibits.
- 2. A "Medicines Administered" form is required for all market animals entering the fair. This form will list all medications given to market animals for the duration of the animal's life, prior to fair. Please turn in your form at the vet check on Wed, July 30th.
- 3. Each exhibitor is required to turn in a photo of themselves with their market animal, clearly showing the animals ear tag, with their entry forms.
- 4. Exhibitor packets will be handed out to each exhibitor at the vet check on Wednesday, July 30th
- 5. All non-market goats entered MUST be registered with the appropriate association prior to entry. A copy of the registration form is due with entry forms.
- 6. Showmanship classes will run in the order of: Seniors 1st, Intermediates 2nd, Juniors 3rd.

"MORE" IMPORTANT INFORMATION FOR 2025

- 1. There will be a 45-minute break between shows to ensure that the exhibitors and judge have a break. The schedule is subject to change.
- 2. All parents, guardians and leaders must sign a Code of Conduct form to ensure understanding of the Fair rules. The form is due Friday June 27, 2025.
- 3. <u>Each Exhibitor is responsible for submitting their own entry forms</u>. No groups entries will be allowed in the office.
- 4. Large animal entry forms are due by 5:00pm Friday May 30, 2025.
- 5. Small animal entry forms are due by 5:00pm Friday June 27, 2025.
- 6. The fair will accept late livestock entry forms up until 5:00pm Friday July 11, 2025, with a \$100 late fee per entry. No entries will be accepted after July 11, 2025. No Exceptions.
- 7. Each Exhibitor, parent and leader must attend the Wednesday Night Fair Rules and Information meeting (July 30th). The meeting will take place at approximately 6:45 pm in the Ace Building after all the weigh-ins are finished. <u>Exhibitor Packets will be available for pickup</u> <u>at Vet checks.</u> Parents and Exhibitor must sign the intent to sell form in order to sell in the auction.
- 8. Auction checks can be picked up starting on Monday, August 18, 2025, in the fair office. All auction checks must be picked up by September 30, 2025, with an addressed and stamped envelope and thank you card. <u>Exhibitors have 90 days to cash their checks</u>. No exceptions.
- 9. Fair staff will be more than happy to assist you with your entry forms prior to due dates. Fair staff is not responsible for exhibitor errors on entry forms.
- 10. Bill of Sales must be attached to the entry forms for ALL LARGE ANIMALS. (i.e., steers, swine, lambs, and goats.) Exhibitors must also include a photo of themselves with their animal, with the animal's ear tag clearly visible.
- 11. Scrapies tags must be attached to sheep and goats prior to pre-fair weigh-ins. No exceptions. The fair will not provide tags.
- 12. Stall cards, food, water, and decorations must stay with your auction animal until Monday after fair. <u>All decorations must be removed, and pens must be cleaned between 10:00am and 6:00pm on Monday August 4, 2025.</u> Failure to provide stall cards, food, water, and clean pens will result in 20% reduction from auction check.

- 13. All rabbits MUST be tattooed prior to pre-fair weigh-ins. They may not be tattooed on the fairground's property.
- 14. Round Robin will only occur if we have a minimum of 3 species represented.
- 15. Each swine club will only be allowed to bring one pig walker to fair for use for the whole club.
- 16. All major clipping MUST be done before bringing animals to the fair. There will be no shearing or body clipping of animals after 8:00pm Wednesday July 30th. Only minor touch-ups will be allowed at the fair with either cordless clippers or scissors. All market lambs must be slick sheared before fair. Any generator brought for blowers MUST be closed frame.
- 17. Each exhibitor **MUST** sell an equivalent of ten (10) auction tickets at \$10 each to avoid a \$150 penalty on each seller's check who does not participate.
- 18. **RATE OF GAIN CONTEST:** Highest rate of gain per large animal species will receive a sponsored award. Rate of gain will not disqualify anyone from the auction but serve as a guideline for exhibitors to learn how their animal gained over the period of time prior to fair.
 - a. Beef 1.5 lbs. per day
 - b. Swine 1.3 lbs. per day
 - c. Sheep 0.4 lbs. per day
 - d. Goats 0.25 lbs. per day

HOW TO ENTER

- 1. **REVIEW THIS FAIR EXHIBITORS' HANDBOOK** to select the classes you would like to enter as well and understanding of the rules.
- READ THE LOCAL RULES and read with special attention the instructions under DEPARTMENT & DIVISION headings for the classes you have chosen and read the CDFA STATE RULES. Copies are available at the Fair Office and online at www.dnfair.org/exhibitors-handbook.
- 3. **PICK UP ENTRY FORMS** from the fair Office, or online at <u>www.dnfair.org</u>. You will need a separate entry form for each Department.
- 4. **COMPLETE** all applicable spaces on the entry forms. Juniors must include their date of birth. Fair staff will be more than happy to assist you. Exhibitor Codes and Entry Numbers will be filled in by Fair Staff. Be sure to SIGN YOUR ENTRY FORMS.
 - a. <u>A SIGNED ENTRY FORM MEANS THAT YOU HAVE READ AND UNDERSTAND</u> <u>THE RULES.</u>

- 5. *REVIEW AND SIGN* each entry form. Submit your entry Forms to the Fair Office. Mailed forms will not be accepted.
 - a. Each Exhibitor is responsible for submitting their own entry forms.
 - b. NO GROUP entries will be allowed in the office.
- 6. There will be a late fee of \$100.00 per livestock entry entered after the entry form due dates. NO ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED AFTER JULY 11, 2025. NO EXCEPTIONS!
 - a. Auction checks will be available in the office on August 18, 2025. You MUST bring in a self-addressed, and postage stamped thank you card to receive check. NO EXCEPTIONS!

LOCAL RULES

PREMIUMS & AWARDS MAY BE WITHHELD IF LOCAL & STATE RULES ARE VIOLATED! CDFA STATE RULES SUPERSEDE LOCAL RULES, UNLESS LOCAL RULES ARE STRICTER.

FAIR STAFF ARE NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR FINDING ERRORS IN ENTERIES!

READ CAREFULLY! (A copy of the CDFA State Rules can be obtained on the Del Norte County Fairs website; <u>www.dnfair.org</u> and in the Fair Office.)

- 1. **OFFICIAL DATES OF FAIR**: Thursday July 31, 2025, through Sunday August 3, 2025. The fair gates will open at 8:00 am and the Commercial Buildings will open to the public at 11:00 am each day of the fair. The buildings will close at 10:00 pm, except for Sunday at 5:00 pm. The barns will close each night at 9:00 pm except for Sunday at 5:00 pm.
- 2. **SANCTION SHOWS:** Sanction show rules do not supersede CDFA State or Local rules.
- 3. **4-H, FFA, GRANGE & INDEPENDENT DEPARTMENTS:** These Departments are for residents of Del Norte County or students that are enrolled in Del Norte Unified School District full time. 4-H, FFA, Grange and Independent members THAT MEET all requirements of their organizations and CDFA State Rules.
 - a. Independent Exhibitors must pick up the registration packet from the fair office prior to declaration of project. IE: Beef 120 days prior to Fair weigh in, Large animals 60 days prior to fair weigh in and small animals 30 days prior to fair weigh in.
- 4. *AGE:* Junior Exhibitors must be 9 years old as of January 1, 2025, to exhibit animals, including horse, with the following exceptions: Small Animal Division participants (Pygmy Goat, Rabbit and Cavy, and Poultry)
 - a. **UNIFORM:** 4-H, FFA, Grange and Independent Exhibitors must wear the fair's official uniform of long sleeve white button up shirt with a collar (no Polo shirts), dark blue or white western style pants and leather style lace up or slip-on type boots and a western style belt. Exhibitors showing small animals may wear closed toe shoes or boots. 4-H, FFA, and Grange members must wear their organization's uniform items i.e., hat, scarf or ties & vest or jacket.
 - b. Exhibitors not in unform will not be allowed in the ring.

5. HOW AND WHEN TO ENTER:

- a. Completed entry forms must be returned to the fair office by 5:00 pm on the closing date for the Divisions as noted in the Entry Schedule of this Fair Exhibitors Handbook.
 - 1. Horse Show Department: Late entries will be accepted.
 - 2. Entry Forms for Large Livestock Entries are due to the Fair Office no later than 5:00pm Friday, May 30, 2025.

- 3. Small Livestock entry forms are due to the Fair Office no later than 5:00 pm Friday June 27, 2025.
- The fair will accept late livestock entry forms until Friday July 11, 2025, with a \$100.00 late fee per entry. No Entries will be accepted after July 11, 2025. No Exceptions!
- b. All non-animal class entries are due Saturday July 19, 2025. Local and CDFA State Rules apply.
 - 1. Entry forms must be complete: Including name, mailing address, date of birth, grade level completed, signature of the 4-H, FFA, Grange and Independent exhibitor, parent and project or club leader, and all information pertaining to the animal entered. For non-animal entries, list the type of product on your entry form. Incomplete forms will not be accepted.
 - 2. Independent Juniors may enter 4-H, FFA or Grange classes providing that they meet the criteria as set forth in the CDFA State rules.
 - 3. The correct entry fees must accompany each entry form.
- c. Leaders, by their signature on the entry form, attest that the member has completed the YQCA course. Entry forms must be signed by members, parents and project or club leaders.
- 6. **CANCELATIONS AND REFUNDS:** Exhibitors canceling their entries for any reason after the official date of closing for entries shall forfeit all entry fees paid, except with a written certificate by a qualified veterinarian.
 - a. Veterinary certificates must state the date of inspection, nature of disqualification and must be filed with the fair office at least 24 hours prior to the opening of the fair. (Veterinarians letterhead required.)
 - b. No refunds of \$5.00 or less will be made (including over payments.)
- 7. **LIABILITY LIMITS:** The exhibitor agrees to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the fair, the County and the State of California from and against any liability, claim, loss or expense (including reasonable attorney's fees) arising out of any injury or damage which is caused by, arises from or is in any way connected with participation in the program or event, excepting only that caused by the sole active negligence of the Fair. The Fair Management shall not be responsible for accidents or losses that may occur to any of the exhibitors or exhibits at the fair. The exhibitor (or parent or guardian of a minor) is responsible for any injury or damage resulting from the exhibitor's participation in the program or event. This includes any injury to others or to the exhibitor or to the exhibitor's property.
- 8. **LIABILITY INSURANCE:** The 41st District Agricultural Association will purchase liability insurance from CFSA for the dates of pre-fair as well as fair. Please note that your homeowner's policy will be the primary policy if needed.
 - a. Animals other than those entered in the fair (and service dogs), will not be allowed on the grounds.
- 9. **IDENTIFICATION:** All 4-H, FFA, Grange and Independent exhibitors who enter Livestock exhibits in the 4-H, FFA or Grange Departments of the Del Norte County fair for the purpose of receiving ribbons paid for by the Fair and for which judges are paid by the fair, shall have a valid Exhibitor wristband.
 - a. LIVESTOCK/JUNIOR EXHIBITOR WRISTBANDS WILL COST \$15.00 EACH. ONLY 1 PER EXHIBITOR.
 - b. Those not wearing a valid wristband must purchase a Season Pass, or a regular admission ticket to the fair.
 - c. All other family members must purchase and wear a wristband to go through the livestock gate. These may be purchased at the fair office for only \$25.00 per adult

and \$15.00 per child not showing an animal. A valid parking pass in each vehicle is required when passing through the Livestock gates.

- 10. **VEHICLES**: No vehicles, except fair owned vehicles, will be allowed to park next to the Livestock barns between the hours of 9:00 am and 9:00 pm daily.
 - a. Unauthorized vehicles which enter prior to the times must be removed by 9:00 am
 - b. Horse and livestock trailers are to enter through the North parking lot "Back Gate" only.
 - c. No parking around the barns. This is a fire safety issue.
 - d. Livestock Parking Passes can be purchased for \$20.00 each. (A limit of 2 per family.)

1. PARKING, CAMPING & RV HOOKUPS:

- RV camping is on a first come, first serve basis.
- The RV Camping is for Vendors and Exhibitors ONLY.
- RV Camping sites are assigned on a first-come, first-served basis and not before Monday June 2, 2025.
- Each 4-H, FFA or Grange Club will be allocated ONE RV site with power to be assigned by the Fair at a rate of \$100 for the duration of fair. Power is NOT available at other sites.
- Electrical hookups will be made from proper power pedestals only. Running electrical cords to wall plug outlets in the building are prohibited.
- Spaces will be assigned according to length.
- Upon your arrival DO NOT park in the RV area BEFORE Checking In with the campground attendant or the Fair Office.
- NO VEHICLE PARKING allowed in the RV area. All illegally parked vehicles in the RV area WILL BE TOWED at the owner's expense.
- One tent is allowed per RV site if it fits in allowable space.
- Quiet time will be 10:00pm to 6:00am daily. NO generators after 10:00pm.
- Anyone camping are required to sign the Adult Code of Ethics form.
- No unchaperoned youths in campsite after 10:00 pm. Parent or Guardian must be present.
- Dry camping \$200.00
- These prices include Tuesday, July 29th through Monday, August 4th. If you want to park your RV the Saturday prior to fair, there is an additional \$50.00 fee required. All fees are due and payable in advance, with this completed agreement.
- THERE ARE NO SWITCHING OF CAMPSITES WITHOUT MANAGEMENT APPROVAL. SWITCHING OF CAMPSITES WITHOUT MANAGEMENT APRROVAL WILL BE GROUNDS FOR IMMEDIATE REMOVAL AND FORFEITURE OF PAYMENT.
- 11. EACH EXHIBITOR MUST SHOW HIS OR HER OWN ANIMAL: Exceptions can be granted only by the Fair Management or Livestock Superintendent.
- 12. **ADDITIONAL ANIMALS:** Each large animal exhibitor will be allowed to raise and enter two market animals of the same species. Large animal exhibitors may only choose one of the two market ready animals entered in the same species for auction at the declaration meeting. Only one market ready animal can be declared for auction per large animal exhibitor. Small animals, please see division limits.
- 13 All animals are to be dropped off, Wednesday, July 30th at designated times (times, TBA) and are subject to a vet check before entering barns.
- 14. The 41st District Agricultural Association has the right to limit the number of entries in any Division or Class.

- 15. WEIGH-IN SCHEDULE: All auction animals must be weighed in at the fairgrounds on entry date, Wednesday July 30, 2025. Large Animals will be weighed: beef at 3:00pm, sheep and goats at 4:00pm and swine at 4:30pm to 5:30pm. Small animals 3:00pm to 4:00pm. Exhibitors must be present at weigh-ins. If you have a conflict with the scheduled times, you must appear before the Fair board at the May, June, or July meeting to request an alternate time to weigh in your animal. A letter must be submitted to the Fair office 12 days prior to the meeting in order to be added to the fair board agenda. Please contact the fairgrounds office immediately when you have knowledge of the conflict to get the Fair Board meeting dates.
 - a) Animals failing to meet lower weight limits may be entered in feeder classes and shown in species showmanship classes. Market animals will be divided into classes by the Livestock Superintendent after weigh in. No excessive water or foreign material will be allowed on the animal at the time of weigh-in. The decision of the weigh clerk doing the weighing shall be final in terms of what constitutes "excessive" or "foreign".
 - b) RE-WEIGHS: If a weight is contested:
 - a. The animal shall be removed from the scale immediately.
 - b. The scale will be rebalanced.
 - c. The animal will be reweighed after the scale is balanced.
 - d. No reweigh will be allowed after an animal has left the scale area or another animal has been weighed.
 - e. Only one reweigh per animal is allowed.
 - f. Second weight is the official weight.
 - c) Animals that do not meet weight requirements or grade will not be sold at auction. Only one weighing per animal will be permitted. (One weighing constitutes one visit to the scale house. If an animal does not make weight, the animal may be taken off the scale and re-weighed at the discretion of the weigh clerk as long as the animal and the exhibitor remain in the scale house.) Request must come from the Exhibitor.
 - d) Large animals to be sold are tagged at the time of weighing according to CDFA State Rules.
 - e) Animals must stay and show after weigh-in, or the exhibitor will not be able to show next year.
- 16. VETERINÁRIAN: The official Del Norte County Fair veterinarian is Town & Country.
- 17. The owner of each animal is responsible for proper care, including feeding and watering of his/her animal(s) at all times while at the fair. <u>Exhibitors are to have their space cleaned</u> <u>by 8:30 am every day.</u> Failure to care for and clean your animals will result in the animal being sent home.
- 18. Attendance at the Declaration Meeting is mandatory to sell all market animals.
- 19. **AWARDS & PREMIUMS:** Placement of ribbons does not guarantee awards. Only the official placing as indicated on the judging sheet shall determine awards.
- 20. **GRAND CHAMPION ANIMALS:** All Grand Champion will be required to be sold through the auction. Each exhibitor is limited to the sale of one animal only. Grand champion winners are allowed to sell one extra market lot. Example: 1 beef, lamb, meat goat, hog, roaster rabbit, stewer rabbit, pen of geese, one pair of ducks, a pen of chickens, single fryer, a pen of three rabbits or a turkey.
- 21. **RELEASE OF EXHIBITS**: Barns close to the public at 5:00pm on Sunday August 3, 2025. Breeding, non-auction or live auction animals must be removed from the barns by 7:00pm Sunday August 3, 2025. *Fair Management are not responsible for any animal left unattended in the barn after 7:00pm.*

- 22. **STALL CARDS, FOOD, WATER & DECORATIONS:** must stay with your auction animal until Monday, August 4, 2025. Failure to provide these items will result in 20% reduction from auction check.
- 23. **PROCESSING LOAD-OUT**: Auction animals that are going to the processor will be released starting at 6:00 am on Monday August 4, 2025. There is a chance that some animals will be loaded out on Sunday evening, August 3, 2025, depending on which processor the animal is being transported to.
 - a. Only the load out team will be allowed in the barn Monday morning.
 - b. No watchmen will be furnished after official release periods.
 - c. Animals not picked up by Monday August 4, 2025 by 5:00 pm will become the property of the fair.
- 24. **ADULT CODE OF CONDUCT:** All parents, guardians and leaders must sign a Code of Conduct form to ensure understanding of the Fair and CDFA State rules. This form is due by June 27, 2025 in the Fair Office.
 - a. Leaders, Parents, and or Guardians shall have no contact with the judge and clerks prior to and during the show.
- 25. No unchaperoned 4-H, FFA, Grange or Independent youth will not be allowed in the barns after 9:00pm.
 - **a.** All unchaperoned youth around the livestock barns will be asked to leave after 9:00pm.
 - **b.** Any drinking of alcoholic beverages by a youth exhibitor will cause for forfeiture of all prizes and the exhibitor will be asked to take his or her exhibit(s) home. Exhibitors will be disqualified for the following fair season.
- 26. No alcohol is allowed except for in approved and permitted areas. No alcohol is permitted in Livestock Barns.
 - **a.** The fairgrounds is a smoke-free zone. Smoking of any kind will not be tolerated on the fairgrounds.
- 27. **YOUTH QUALITY CARE ASSURANCE:** All Livestock Exhibitors must complete the YQCA online program to be eligible to sell their animal at auction. THIS IS A STATE REQUIREMENT. THERE WILL BE NO EXCEPTIONS.

YQCA Yearly Online Ethics Course

- In compliance with the rules for California Fairs, proof of completion of the one-hour Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) Online Ethics course will be required of all animal exhibitors prior to entering the 2025 Del Norte County Fair. Once the Exhibitor completes the course with a passing score, a completion Certificate with a corresponding Certificate number will be issued. The Exhibitor is required to print the certificate out and bring it to the fair office. Emailed certificates will not be accepted.
- 2. What is the Youth for The Quality Care of Animals Online Ethics Course All About?

Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) is a national multi-species quality assurance program for youth ages 8 to 21. YQCA is the result of a collaborative effort between states that have previously offered multi-species youth livestock quality assurance programs, the National Pork Board's Youth PQA Plus program and representatives from other national livestock groups. The program has been designed by extension specialists and national livestock program managers to ensure it is accurate, current, and relevant to the needs of the animal industry and shows and is appropriate for youth.

• The program is designed to provide an estimated 60 minutes of education each year. The online program requires the passing of a series of three

quizzes to earn certification. YQCA isdesigned as an annual education and certification program focused on food safety, animal well-being and character awareness for youth ages 8 to 21 producing and/or showing pigs, beef cattle, dairy cattle, sheep, goats, market rabbits, and poultry.

- The online program includes three components for each topic (food safety, animal well- being, and character development), and are designed specifically for each age group:
- Knowledge builder allows students to learn new information in an engaging, age- appropriate and interactive format. Students can read content, watch videos, analyze pictures, and practice skills while progressing through a series of interactive content components.
- Skills lab Offers realistic situational opportunities for youth to apply the new knowledge gained in the knowledge builder. These labs take students through a comprehensive journey of the content, requiring them to apply skills and make decisions resembling those they will face in real life. To fulfill their year of training, youth will complete three of these online modules.
- Quiz for each content topic The quiz is the final piece of the online learning experience, testing student's overall knowledge of the content. Students can receive immediate feedbackor see their results at the conclusion of the quiz. A pass rate of 80% has been established with students being able to repeat the module if needed.
- 3. **Who must take the course?** All animal youth exhibitors ages 9-21 must take the online course and upload and print their certificate of completion when entering online. Upon completion, bring your printed copy to the fair office.
- 4. **How to register for the YQCA Ethics Course.** To register go to: <u>https://yqcaprogram.org/</u> and create an account.
 - a) A separate account is required for each Exhibitor. Siblings cannot take the course together as each will need an individual Certificate number for their Fair Entry. The course is \$12 per exhibitor.
 - b) Clubs/projects may fundraise to cover the costs, as YQCA does offer coupon codes which are one-time use codes that cover the registration costs. More information on the coupon codes can be found here: http://yqca.org/buy-coupons/.

DEL NORTE COUNTY 4-H, FFA, GRANGE & INDEPENDENT DEPARTMENT RULES

This Department is for residents of Del Norte County or students that are **enrolled in Del Norte Unified School District full time.** 4-H, FFA, Grange, and Independent members meeting all the requirements of their organizations and CDFA State rules.

- These organizations desire competition among members and fairs cooperate by offering divisions and classes for them.
- 4-H, FFA, Grange and Independent Market and Showmanship classes will be shown together in each species. The fair has the right to divide classes if needed.

- Fairs also provides the opportunity for young people who are not members of such organizations to exhibit and compete. The Del Norte County Fair does this by offering divisions and classes in accordance with Local Rules #3.
- Each Exhibitor, parent and leader must attend the Wednesday Night Fair rules and information meeting. The meeting will take place at approximately 6:00pm in the Ace Building after all weigh-ins are finished.
- Independent Juniors may enter in the age-appropriate classes providing they meet the criteria as set forth in the State Rules which are available at the Fair Office or online at the Fair website.
- 1. Each Club with animals in a barn must provide barn duty.
- 2. Exhibits must be the work of the Exhibitor.
- 3. AGE: You must be 9 years old as of January 1, 2025, to exhibit in 4-H, FFA, Grange and Independent classes.
- 4. All Grand Champions will be required to be sold through the auction.
- 5. Each exhibitor is limited to the sale of one animal only. Grand Champion winners are allowed to sell one extra lot. Example: 1 beef, lamb, meat goat, hog, roaster rabbit, stewer rabbit, pen of geese, or one pair of ducks or a pen of chickens, single fryer, or a pen of three rabbits or turkey.
- 6. All stalls, coops and cages are to be cleaned and animals fed by 8:30 am and 8:30 pm every day. Each exhibitor or club must provide their own equipment (shovel, broom, wheelbarrow, pitchfork, etc.).
- 7. Wash racks will be closed from 11:00 am to 6:00 pm daily.
- 8. Market animals must be owned by and under the exhibitor's management for a minimum of 120 days from the opening of the fair for market beef, 60 days for market swine, sheep, and goats. All small market animals must be owned for 30 days. All breeder and feeder animals must be owned by the exhibitor for 30 days. For more clarification, please refer to the CDFA State Rules. Attendance at the stated weigh-in is mandatory.
- 9. **Bill of sale for ALL LARGE LIVESTOCK ANIMALS must accompany Exhibitor Form. Identification ear tag and Scrapies tag numbers, must be on the bill of Sale.** Exhibitors must also include a photo of themselves with their animal, with the animal's ear tag clearly visible.
- 10. ALL EXHIBITORS MUST SHOW IN SHOWMANSHIP DIVISION IN ORDER TO QUALIFY FOR AUCTION. Showmanship is required for all 4-H, FFA, Grange & Independent members entered in a market class.
- 11. All major clipping MUST be done before bringing animals to the fair. Only minor touch-ups will be allowed at the fair with either cordless clippers or scissors. All market lambs must be slick sheared. Any generator brought for blowers MUST be closed frame.
- 12. Small Animal Exhibitors must be present when animals are judged.
- 13. **ANIMAL FEE:** \$10.00 per large animal and all goats. \$2.00 per small animal (per pen). This will include bedding for all days. Due to the number of pens, animals may be placed 2 per pen.

Herdsmanship Competition, for club in each species, takes place during the entire run of the fair.

The four factors, in order of their importance, for judging meat rabbits/pens, are as follows: Meat Type, Condition, Uniformity, and Fur.

Meat pens shall consist of three rabbits, all of the same breed and variety. Broken group meat pens must also be of the same variety. A meat pen does not necessarily have to come from the same litter. Age limit 10 weeks. Minimum weight 3.5 lbs. each. Maximum weight 5.5lbs each. All rabbits must be weighed in the presence of the judge.

DIVISION 970: RABBIT MARKET CLASSES

ROUND ROBIN RULES

- 1. Large Animal Round Robin will take place in the already established arenas: Except for goats and lambs, which will have arenas set up in the Ace Barn.
- 2. Small Animal Round Robin will take place in the Ace Pavilion and will include Cavy, Pygmy Goat, Rabbit, & Poultry.
- 3. To qualify for Round Robin, you must win 1st or 2nd place overall showmanship in a species.
- 4. Champion and 2nd place Showman must participate in Round Robin in each species. If a Champion or 2nd Place Showman wins in more than one species, then the 3rd place winner of the species not chosen by the Champion or 2nd Place Showman will advance to Round Robin. All Champion and 2nd Place animals will compete in Round Robin.
- 5. Showman must declare which species that they are participating in Round Robin at the end of Friday show day.
- 6. All Exhibitors must sign the Round Robin form at the end of Friday.
- 7. Round Robin animal must be the same animal that was shown in showmanship.
- 8. You must show your own species that you won showmanship with.
- 9. The official Fair Uniform dress code will apply.

- 10. Each contestant will start by showing their own animal (with the exception of 3rd place showman), and then proceed to show every species in the contest. Horse species will not be included in large animal round robin.
- 11. Each rotation will be a 6 minutes per species.
- 12. Scoring will be done on a point system from 0 50.
- 13. Judges are predetermined by the Fair Management and Livestock Superintendent.
- 14. The Fair Management and Livestock Superintendent reserves the right to exchange an animal for any reason.

15. The judge's decision is final.

- 16. There will be a meeting for Round Robin participants on Friday night at 4:00pm or right after the Dairy show.
- 17. In the event of a tie, the highest overall response to questions score will determine the winner.

LIVESTOCK AUCTION RULES OPEN TO 4-H, FFA, GRANGE AND INDEPENDENT

The Del Norte County Livestock Auction Committee is conducted by an independent sale committee sanctioned by the Fair. <u>The Committee, together with Fair Management and Livestock Superintendent, reserves the right to limit the number of entries or to disqualify as ineligible for sale any entry which endangers the public or is otherwise not in the best interest of the sale or the Fair. Neither the Auction Committee nor the Fair guarantees sale of any animal or minimum price of any kind; and assumes no liability in connection with the sale.</u>

- 1. Refer or the Local Rules and CDFA State Rules.
- 2. <u>SHOWMANSHIP is required</u> for participation in the auction. Poultry exhibitors may show any species of poultry.
- 3. Animals entered in the auction must be animals that have first been shown in poultry, rabbit or market animal classes in the 2025 Del Norte County Fair.
- 4. Only animals having met the weight requirements and grading in the following groups will be sold; Beef, Sheep, Meat Goats, Swine, Rabbits, & Poultry (Market Ready). **Animals must be clean and sound.**
- 5. Each exhibitor is limited to the sale of one animal only. Grand Champion winners are allowed to sell one extra lot. Example: 1 beef, lamb, meat goat, hog, goose, roaster rabbit, stewer rabbit, or one pair of ducks or a pen of chickens, single fryer or a pen of three rabbits or turkey.
- 6. EACH EXHIBITOR MUST SHOW HIS OR HER ANIMAL IN THE SALE RING.

- 7. Sale order will be Grand Champion and Reserve Champion of each species, followed by all gold then silver market ready animals by class placement.
- 8. The seller's family will be allowed one bid if dissatisfied with the top bid received. All sales are final.
- 9. To help defray costs of the sale, including but not limited to buyer default, or death or condemnation of an animal, the Committee and Fair reserves the right to deduct 5% of the gross sale of each lot.
- 10. There will be an auction declaration meeting at 4:00 pm on Friday August 1st in the Ace Pavilion for all sellers whose animals make Market Ready. Declaration forms will be turned in at that time.
- 11. Parents and Exhibitor must sign the intent to sell form in order to sell in the auction.
- 12. THIS MEETING IS MANDATORY FOR ALL SELLERS. Sellers must be present. Failure to make this meeting will result in a 15% reduction from auction check.
- 13. Picture taking will be done 30 minutes before Showmanship and 30 minutes after show. Retakes will be after the declaration meeting. Anyone not present for picture taking will have 10% deducted from their auction checks.
- 14. No animals will be sold during the fair except those going through the auction.
- 15. Sales made outside the auction may cause seller to face serious consequences.
- 16. Each club must provide four (4) runners in uniform during the auction; failure to do so will result in a 5% deduction from all auction checks for club not represented.
- 17. Each exhibitor **MUST** sell an equivalent of ten (10) auction tickets at \$10 each to avoid a \$150 penalty on each seller's check who does not participate.
- 18. All buyers will be given a receipt covering purchases made. Auction settlement booth will be located at ringside. All new buyers must be present and supply a credit card number to receive an auction bid number.
- 19. All checks for animals purchased are to be made payable to <u>41st District Agricultural</u> <u>Association</u>. Del Norte County Fair will make payment to 4-H, FFA, Grange or Independent members on **Monday August 18th at the fairground's office starting at** 9:00 am. <u>Only the exhibitors can pick up their auction checks.</u> Exhibitor must bring in a "Thank You" card addressed and stamped to the buyer.
- 20. All small animals are to be picked up live.
- 21. No animal may be removed from the fairgrounds until after the close of the fair.
- 22. All rules and regulations of the Del Norte County Fair will be adhered to. Exceptions to these rules can be granted only by the Auction Committee and the Fair Manager.
- 23. Sellers are responsible for providing their buyer with a gift at the time of sale.

DEL NORTE COUNTY YOUTH HORSE SHOW June 22, 2025

- Unless other rules are specified, rules and definitions for conducting each judged class at contained in the USEF Rule book, and for each Gymkhana Class as contained in the California Gymkhana Rule Book will apply to this Horse Show provided, they do not conflict with any of the rules and regulations prescribed by the Division of Fairs and Expositions of the California Department of Food and Agriculture.
- 2. RESPONSIBILITES: the management will not be responsible for any loss, personal injury, or damage to horses exhibited, or for any article of any kind or nature that may be lost or destroyed, or in any way damaged. Each exhibitor will be responsible for any injury that may occur to any person or animal, or damage to any property, while on the

grounds, by horse owned or exhibited by him/her.

- 3. Best of Show (first and second place) winners will qualify to enter the 2024 State Best of Show Youth Horse Show in Sacramento.
- 4. Highpoint will be based on the total points accumulated by each class in each division. There is no minimum or maximum number of classes required for Highpoint.
 - 1st place.....5 points
 - 2nd place......3 points
 - 3rd place.....1 point
- 5. Certified helmets are mandatory <u>when on a horse</u> (Helmets must be approved by the American Society for testing and Materials/Safety Equipment Institute).
- 6. No more <u>than one horse and rider on each form.</u> May enter multiple horses if they are not in the same class.
- 7. ATTIRE: 4-H, FFA, Grange & Independent members must wear the fair's official uniform of white button up shirt with a collar (no polo shirts), dark blue or white western style pants and leather style lace up or slip-on boot and western style belt for Showmanship, Conformation and Western Classes. English attire for the English Classes, (English pants and boots).
- 8. 4-H, FFA & Grange members must wear their organization's uniform items: hat, scarf or tie, vest, or jacket.
- 9. The decision of the judge is final.
- 10. Exhibitors must be 9 and under 19 years of age as of January 1, 2025.
- 11. Showmanship classes are open to Del Norte County 4-H, FFA, Grange and Independent Juniors only.
 - First place in Showmanship classes will return to the ring for champion Showman.
 - First place in the Halter classes will return for Champion Halter.
 - High Point Rosette (highpoint will be based on riders' points per division)
 - W/J (Walk/Jog) Classes are for beginners and will not count for High Point.
 - Conformation Classes don't count for High Point.

The Secretary of the Department of Food and Agriculture requires random testing of horses entered in horse show, horse competitions of horse sales. The management of these events will charge and collect a \$5.00 fee for each horse entered per event.)
