## ~ HOW TO ENTER ~

1. REVIEW THIS FAIR EXHIBITOR'S HANDBOOK to select the classes you would like to enter.
2. READ THE LOCAL RULES and read with special attention to the instructions under DEPARTMENT \& DIVISION headings for the classes you have chosen and CDFA STATE RULES. Copies are available at the Fair Office if you need them.
3. PICK UP ENTRY FORMS from the Fair Office, or online at www.dnfair.org. A separate entry form is required for each Department.
4. NO LIMIT on entries unless specified in Divisions or Departments.
5. COMPLETE all applicable spaces on the entry forms. Juniors must include their date of birth and be 18 or under as of Jan 1 of this year. Fair Staff will be happy to assist you. Exhibitor Codes and Entry Numbers will be filled in by Fair Staff. Be sure to SIGN YOUR ENTRY FORMS.
a) Completed entry forms must be returned to the fair office or postmarked by 5:00 pm on the closing date for entries as noted in the Entry Schedule of this Fair Exhibitor's Handbook. Fair staff is not responsible for finding errors in exhibitor entries.
b) Mailed entry forms will be rejected if postmarked after closing dates. All late entries must
be handed into the fair office no later than the receiving date for that item. These items are subject to a late fee of $\$ 5.00$ per entry for the first 5 entries and $\$ 2.50$ for each entry over 5. (NON-ANIMAL ENTRIES ONLY)
c) Exhibits must be brought to the fairgrounds during days and hours designated under Department and Division headings and in the Entry Schedule. Exhibits not received during specified periods will not be accepted.
d) Exhibitor's name or other identification may NOT appear on the visible portion of any exhibit (except animals). Exhibit cards will be pre-printed at the fair office and be attached when you bring your exhibits to the fair. Please allow time to do this. Following judging, exhibit cards will be opened by fair clerks for public viewing.
e) REVIEW AND SIGN each entry form. Take your completed Entry Forms to the Fair Office, or email to: dhorner@dnfair.org or mail them to: DEL NORTE COUNTY FAIR, 421 Hwy 101 N, Crescent City, CA 95531, or Fax to (707) 464-9519. Entry forms must be delivered or postmarked by 5:00 pm on the closing date as given for each department.
6. EXHIBIT CARDS will be pre-printed and attached when you bring your items to the fair. Please allow time to do this.
7. Late entry forms are only accepted in the fair office and are subject to a late fee.
8. LATE FEE: There will be a late fee for entries received after the due date listed of $\$ 5.00$ per entry for the first 5 entries, $\$ 2.50$ for each entry over 5. (NON-ANIMAL ENTRIES ONLY)
9. Final entry form accepting date is July 29th until midnight by email or online. NO EXCEPTIONS!!!! (NON-ANIMAL ENTRIES ONLY)
10. BRING YOUR EXHIBITS to the fairgrounds ON THE DAYS AND HOURS INDICATED under the Department Headings of this Fair Exhibitor's Handbook. At this time pick up your Exhibitor's Pass. Exhibitor Pass prices are listed on page 2 of this handbook.
11. No exhibitor shall receive more than two awards in any class using the American judging system.
12. COME AND ENJOY THE FAIR.
13. PICK UP your exhibits after the close of the Fair. See release times under the Release of Exhibits.
14. PREMIUM AWARDS may be picked up at the fairground's office, Wednesday, August 16, 2023.

## ~ LOCAL RULES ~ <br> PREMIUMS \& AWARDS MAY BE WITHHELD IF LOCAL \& STATE RULES ARE VIOLATED! FAIR STAFF IS NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR FINDING ERRORS IN ENTRIES!

READ CAREFULLY! (A copy of the State Rules can be obtained on the Del Norte County Fairs website; www.dnfair.org and in the fair office.)

1. OFFICIAL DATES OF FAIR: Thursday August 3, 2023 through Sunday August 6, 2023. The fairgrounds will open to the public at 8:00 am each day of the fair. The buildings will open at 11:00am and close each night at 9:00pm except Sunday (5:00pm). The fairgrounds will close at 10:00pm, except Sunday (5:00 pm). The barns will close each night at 9:00 pm except Sunday (5:00 $\mathrm{pm})$.
2. SANCTION SHOWS: Sanction show rules do not supersede CDFA State or Local rules.
3. 4-H, FFA, \& GRANGE DEPARTMENTS: This Department is for residents of Del Norte County or students that are enrolled in Del Norte Unified School District full time. 4-H, FFA, and Grange members meeting all the requirements of their organizations and CDFA State rules.
4. ADULT, JUNIOR \& SENIOR DIVISIONS: Entries are open to all exhibitors without restriction as to residence.
5. EXHIBITOR OF THE YEAR AWARD: This award will go to the eligible Adult and Junior Exhibitor earning the highest overall score.
a. Exhibitors are eligible when they exhibit in 3 or more non-animal departments and place in at least two departments.
b. Prizes won in all departments will count as follows: 5 points for each 1st place, 3 points for each 2nd place, 1 point for each 3rd place and an additional 5 points for each Best of Show.
c. Adult Exhibitor of the Year award is $\$ 100.00$. Junior Exhibitors of the year - 1st Place $\$ 75$, 2nd Place \$50, 3rd Place \$25.
6. CANCELLATIONS \& REFUNDS: Exhibitors canceling their entries for any reason after the official date of closing for entries shall forfeit all entry fees paid.
a. No refunds of $\$ 5.00$ or less will be made (including over payments).
7. AWARDS \& PREMIUMS: Placement of ribbons does not guarantee awards; only the official placing as indicated on the judging sheet shall determine awards.
a. PREMIUM AWARDS WILL NOT BE MAILED. Premium awards will be available in the fair office starting Wednesday, August $16^{\text {th }}$. Awards not picked up within 60 days of the fair will be void.
b. No exhibitor shall receive more than two awards in any class using the American judging system.
c. When an exhibitor earns more than two awards in a class, the exhibitor will receive the two highest cash awards, and the lesser cash awards will be moved down the placings to other exhibitors; ribbons will be awarded as placed.
d. Any difference in payments limits under the Danish system of judging shall be printed in the Exhibitor Handbook.
8. RELEASE OF EXHIBITS: All non-animal exhibits will be released on Monday August 7, 2023 from 8:00 am to 6:00 pm.
The Fair reserves the right to dispose of exhibits not claimed during the specified release period.
Entries not picked up by 5:00 pm Friday August 11, 2023 will become the property of the fair and will be disposed of.
9. No watchmen will be furnished after official release periods.
10. EXHIBITOR'S PASS may be purchased after exhibits have been accepted for judging.
a. Exhibitors will receive an Exhibit Acceptance Slip upon delivery of exhibits to the fairgrounds which may then be brought to the office to purchase an Exhibitor's Pass.
b. Exhibitor Pass prices are listed on page 2 of this book.
c. Only one Exhibitor Pass will be sold per Exhibitor. Good for all 4 days of the fair.
d. Exhibitor's Passes are non-transferable.
e. Holders of a valid Exhibitor's Pass shall be admitted to the fair daily when presenting the pass to the gate attendant.
f. Lost Exhibitor Passes will not be replaced.
g. The Del Norte County Fair reserves the right to issue and sell passes which are deemed to be in the best interest of the Del Norte County Fair.
11. IDENTIFICATION: All 4-H, FFA, Grange and Independent exhibitors who enter Livestock exhibits in the 4-H, FFA or Grange Departments of the Del Norte County Fair for the purpose of receiving ribbons paid for by the Fair and for which judges fees are paid by the Fair, shall have a valid 4H/FFA/Grange wristband.
a. Those not wearing a valid wristband must purchase an Exhibitor's Pass, a regular admission ticket or a season ticket.
12. VEHICLES: No vehicles, except fair owned vehicles, will be allowed to enter the fairgrounds (other than the Main \& North Parking Lots) between the hours of 9:00 am and 9:00 pm daily.
13. LIABILITY LIMITS: The exhibitor agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless the fair, the County and the State of California from and against and liability, claim, loss or expense (including reasonable attorneys' fees) arising out of any injury or damage which is caused by, arises from or is in any way connected with participation in the program or event, excepting only that caused by the sole active negligence of the Fair. The Fair Management shall not be responsible for accidents or losses that may occur to any of the exhibitors or exhibits at the fair. The exhibitor (or parent or guardian of a minor) is responsible for any injury or damage resulting from the exhibitor's participation in the program or event. This includes any injury to others or to the exhibitor or to the exhibitor's property.

In an attempt to ensure impartiality, the Del Norte County Fair does their best to secure judges for most categories from outside the community. The dedication and effort of these judges is to be commended as their fees, while sufficient to cover travel costs, are inadequate compensation for the hours they give to our fair. A special "THANK YOU" to these judges who will be serving us this year.

## JUDGING SYSTEMS

## American System

Exhibits in this system are compared against a standard of perfection, as well as against the other entries in the competition. All exhibits in a particular class are looked at and ranked with only one selected for first place, second place, third place, etc. Only First Place in Class exhibits qualify for Best of Division.

## Danish System

In this system all Exhibitors receive a ribbon. All exhibits are grouped according to quality, and there may be multiple entries that get the same ranking and ribbon. Quality may vary from excellent to fair, and ribbon categories may be blue, red, white and/or yellow. In this system of judging, exhibits are not in competition with or compared to each other.

## ~ADULT, SENIOR \& JUNIOR DEPARTMENTS~

These departments are open to all juniors, adults, and seniors without restriction as to residence. Junior classes are listed immediately after adult classes in each department.

## ADULT AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT

1. Produce which becomes wilted or over ripe during the fair will be removed from display and may be replaced by exhibitors on Saturday August $5^{\text {th }}$ from 8:00 am to 10:00 am only.
2. Exhibits cannot be wrapped (except herbs).
3. Enter only the number of specimens requested. Uniformity of size is important.
4. The quality desired in agricultural products is that which brings the best financial return in the commercial market.
5. Exhibits must be at least equal in maturity to the state of ripeness required by California Agricultural Code Section 42513 in order to be eligible for premium awards.
a) "Mature" means a stage of ripeness that will ensure completion of the ripening process to a degree that will insure palatability after removal of the product from the tree, plant, or vine.
b) "Over ripe" means having an advanced stage of maturity which causes the product to be undesirable for human consumption in a fresh state.
6. VEGETABLES: Unless otherwise noted, the type desired for exhibit will be the uniform commercial grade rather than overgrown.
a) MONSTROSITIES may be entered and displayed as items of general interest.
b) CORN to be untrimmed
c) ONIONS to be unskinned
d) DILL: (2 seed heads with 4-to-6-inch stalks tied together, no roots)

- 6 large eggs
- 3 cups sugar
- $11 / 2$ tablespoon vanilla extract
- 36 walnut halves (Optional)


## Directions

1. Preheat the oven to 325 degrees $F$ and butter a $151 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 101 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 2$ " baking pan. In a small saucepan, melt the butter and chocolate over low heat; cool. Onto a piece of wax paper, sift the flour and salt, then toss with the walnuts.
2. In a large bowl, with an electric mixer on high, beat the eggs just until foamy. Add the sugar, then the cooled chocolate mixture and vanilla, and beat just until blended.
3. Stir in the flour mixture just until it disappears, then spoon into the pan; top with the walnut halves if you wish.
4. Bake for 35 minutes or just until set and toothpick inserted in the center comes out almost clean.
5. Let cool in the pan for 15 minutes; cut into $2 \times 1 \frac{112}{2}$ inch bars. Makes $31 / 2$ dozen.

Perishable items only may be added to exhibits on Wednesday August 2, 2023, from 8:00 am to 8:00 pm and may be replaced if wilted on Saturday August 6 from 9:00 am to 10:00 am. Booths must be removed on Monday August 7, 2023, between 8:00 am and 6:00 pm.
2. Booths should educate the public about a specific phase of the $4-H$ or FFA program, showing what they have learned, activities they have participated in, or the contributions of their organization to the community. Judges will insist upon a high quality of products and materials used; booths should be artistically arranged, colorful, attractive and well lighted. Booths need not conform to the fair theme.
3. Booth spaces provided by the fair measure 8' by 8' in size. Booths must be designed, installed and decorated by organization members. Parents and leaders may help install any aspect of the booth where the health or safety of the $4-\mathrm{H}$ member is at risk. If in violation of this rule, awards will not be given. Leaders and advisers may not sign entry forms as agents for $4-\mathrm{H}$ or FFA organizations. State rule II. 2 does not apply to feature booths.
4. Members must make arrangements to replace any fruits or vegetables used which deteriorate during the fair.
NOTE: The public is excluded from the Feature Booth area during judging.
